Forklift Safety Equipment - There are a variety of operations and industries, like for example agricultural, manufacturing and warehousing that make use of powered industrial trucks together with forklift trucks or lift trucks on a regular basis in the place of work. Lift trucks are used to be able to raise or lower stuff or transfer stuff that are stored on pallets or in containers to different locations in the workplace. These industrial machines aid in order to improve productivity at the job location by lessening the need for excessive manual handling of things by workers. According to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, there are just about twenty thousand serious injuries every year in America and more or less a hundred fatalities because of the result of lift truck incidents.

There are different types of forklifts which have different load capacities. These models differ for specific forward center of gravity and maximum weight where a load is concerned. Worker injuries typically take place as a result from falls from the forklift, forklift overturn, crushing incidents or collision with pedestrians. Operator falls could occur as the worker descends or ascends into the driver cab or becomes ejected from the machine in the event of a collision or an accident. Lift trucks could overturn because of being overloaded, or having an unequal center of gravity of the cargo or traveling over an uneven surface which could cause the vehicle to topple over. It is significant for other co-workers to follow strict preventive measures whenever working next to the forklift. Without ample preventive measures, pedestrian co-workers are at risk from collisions or accidents associated with an unsafe cargo.

In relation to lift truck operation, training and maintenance, there are strict training and standards to be observed. Like for example, people who are below 18 years old and are in non-agricultural industries are permitted not to operate a forklift truck. It is necessary that all lift truck operators should have undergone both practical and theoretical training prior to commencing forklift operation and they are likewise needed to take refresher courses.

The "American National Standard for Powered Industrial Trucks, ANSI B56.1-1969 are the standards which all powered industrial trucks must follow. The particular OSHA standards that employers as well as employees have to follow as stated in the General Industry Standards comprise 1910.178 "Powered industrial trucks", and standards for Marine Terminals 29 CFR 1917 Subpart C, "Cargo handling gear and equipment" and Long shoring 29 CFR 1918 Subpart G, "Cargo handling gear and equipment other than ship's gear.

It is likewise important for employers know the different other regulations and directives. The NIOSH and OSHA regulations both outline for the employers and employees to all the regulations which apply.
